

Roark (Ph.D., Stanford University) is Samuel Candler Dobbs Emeritus Professor of American History at Emory University. He received the Emory Williams University Award for Excellence in Teaching, and in 2001-2002 he was a professor at the Pitt American Institutes at the University of Cambridge. He wrote Masters Without Slaves: Southern Planters in Civil War and Reconstruction and co-authored Black Masters: Free Family of Color in the Old South with Michael. Johnson. 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She wrote Calculating People: The Proliferation of Numberings in Early America and the Murder of Helen Jewett: the Life and Death of a Prostitute in the Nineteenth Century in New York, and she co-authored Flash Press: Sports Men's Weekly in 1840s in New York. Sarah Haight (Ph.D., Yale University) is a professor of women's studies at Arizona State University. Her books include Women's Complaints: Lydia Pinkham and the Business of Women's Medicine and the Rethinking of Economics: Women and the History of the Profession. Her last two books are edited volumes: Moral Panic of Sexuality and Conversion of Infection. Susan M. Hartmann (Ph.D., University of Missouri) is Professor emeritus of art and humanities history at Ohio State University. In 1995, she received an exemplary award from the University Faculty at the College of Humanities. Its publications include Truman and the 80th Congress; Home Front and Beyond: American Women in the 1940s; From margin to mainstream: American women and politics since 1960; and other feminists: Liberal activists.
